BUCKS COUNCILLORS NEWS.

Learn to be a Better Biker. Bucks Council is encouraging bikers of all ages and experience to enhance their riding skills with the help of a specialist course.

The Be a Better Biker (BaBB) workshops are run as part of the council's Travel Safe Bucks road safety initiative, in partnership with Thames Vale Advanced Motorcyclists, Bucks Advanced Riders & Drivers, Milton Keynes Advanced Motorists, Oxford Advanced Motorcyclists and local fire and rescue services. The aim is to reduce the number of bikers killed or injured on the roads and equip motorcyclists with additional skills to keep safe.

Costing just £20 per person, the workshops cover a range of advanced techniques including:

- Manoeuvring
- Overtaking
- Cornering techniques
- An on-road assessment with a qualified observer
- A review of the on-road session.

Courses are taking place across the Thames Valley region and locally at:

- Saturday 6 April Winslow Fire Station
- Saturday 20 April Chesham Fire Station

• Saturday 18 May – Princes Risborough Fire Station

Now in their 15th year, the courses have helped hundreds of bikers in Bucks to improve their skills on the road.

Anyone wishing to take part must hold a full and valid motorbike licence and have access to their own vehicle to use during the course.

Transform your street into a Play Street! Communities across Buckinghamshire are being invited to take advantage of a scheme which highlights the importance of outdoor play and encourages neighbours to spend time socialising together, promoting the benefits for health and wellbeing in all ages.

Play Streets invites residents from communities across the county to apply for permission, free of charge, to close their road for a few hours at a time so that they can come together outside their homes to socialise, reduce social isolation and play safely. The scheme is part of the national Playing Out initiative and has been running successfully in Buckinghamshire for several years. Roads are closed to traffic for the duration, but pedestrian access is allowed, and residents can enjoy spending time together outside their homes.

Bin-spiring volunteers collect bagfuls of litter during Great British Spring Clean. Communities around Buckinghamshire have been busy binning and bagging this spring, as Keep Britain Tidy's Great British Spring Clean has completed its ninth annual run. Committed Bucks residents have come together as part of the country's biggest mass action environmental campaign, collecting and safely disposing of litter from streets, parks and open spaces across the county.

Following this year's theme 'the environment is for everyone', community groups and individuals in Buckinghamshire organised over 94 litter picking events around the county – a record breaking year for Buckinghamshire. The majority of the events took place in the south where more than 926 volunteers collected over 1,723 bags, and clocked over 1,852 volunteer hours.

Although The Great British Spring Clean is over for this year, the need for litter picking stays. The council empties over 4,000 litter bins every week, but over 2 million pieces of litter are dropped every single day in the UK, littering our towns and countryside.

Anyone can organise a litter pick or join an existing litter pick group. To get you started, the council can help you to organise a litter pick in your local area by lending litter pick equipment, providing waste bags and collecting the waste after the litter pick has finished. You can find more information on the council's website.

Litter picking isn't just a group activity and doesn't have to take a lot of time. As an individual, you can take part in the Litter Lotto – it's easy, simply download the Litter Lotto app on your phone and take a photo in the app, of yourself throwing some litter into a bin. This doesn't only tidy up our streets, but also gives you an opportunity to win instant cash prizes and offers, as well as giving you the chance of winning a weekly £1,000 jackpot. Local Litter Lotto users also have a chance to win an extra £250 in an exclusive monthly prize draw, aimed just at people binning litter in Bucks!

FARMING AND FOOD

Well, the sun has put his hat on!

The farmers are all very busy out in the fields cultivating and drilling seed. Its rather late but better late than never and we can look forward with hope that we will have a better harvest. Water is still lying about in places where we get machines stuck...and it can take all day to clean out all the coulters in a seed drill! But there is a more positive vibe on the farm.

Farmers continue to diversify from the regular crops we grow in an effort to become more profitable. I see that daffodils are now providing an alkaloid used in the slowing down of the progress of Alzheimer's disease. It has been found that growing daffodils at altitude stimulates the production of galanthamine, the so-called Black Mountain effect. The farmer growing these plants has them up on a hillside in Wales at 1,200 feet. And they thrive in a cold, wet, miserable spring! Sheep don't eat daffodils so it's possible to graze the fields with sheep to keep the grass down! And apparently research has shown you can produce the same amount of sheep meat per acre in a field with daffodils as a field without. So don't be surprised to see geographical clusters of daffodils and sheep on the mountains of Wales.

Another diversification is the growing of Elephant grass or Miscanthus. This does not mind flooded fields or drought cracked fields. Planted just once it means soil disturbance is kept to a minimum and it is noted for the amount of carbon stored in its root. It is used as fuel for biomass boilers and as bedding for horses.

The land used for arable farming food production in the UK is declining and vertical farming systems have a huge potential. This allows growers to carefully manage the crops and produce perfect crops all year round. I recently saw a documentary on salad crops being grown on the roofs of buildings in a city.

Smart farming technologies such as wearable sensors are being developed to monitor the health of livestock in real time, helping farmers to monitor their health and welfare. The types of wearable devices include e-tags, cow collars and electronic earrings!

During May, my wife and I move to Derbyshire where I shall take up a new post in the church. Although it is fewer churches, it is significantly more people and a combination of rural, urban, estate and schools ministry.

That combination and the breadth of ministry across the Benefice here is the reminder that "church" is not a case of one size fits all; but it is also a salutary reminder that church is equally valid from the formal to the informal. That means that engaging with the various ways of being church is a worthwhile exercise because, who knows, one might suddenly hear, encounter, the same message in a "language" we were not expecting.

From my vicar days in Norfolk, I remember being greatly heartened by a group of octogenarians enjoying Mattins from the Book of Common Prayer who, the week before, had readily taken up percussion instruments to accompany the worship band at Café Church. As the Benefice enters the time to discern a new Team Rector, I encourage you to continue to engage with church and perhaps, (maybe?) go to something very different to your usual choice – and not necessarily in your home church.

Finally however, my very best wishes for the life of your several and varied village communities and to thank you for the time we have had here.



A MESSAGE FROM THE MINISTER.

"Come out of your shell." For me a walk along the beach is incomplete without gazing at seashells as I listen to the waves lap against the seashore and inhale the salty sea breeze. The relics of these amazing creatures appear in a variety of shapes, sizes, textures, and colours. Whilst I enjoy looking fixedly at seashells on the seashore, I must not only take a moment to contemplate on its shape and form, but to think about who made it and the life it might have had, for something to 'come out of the shell'.

At a 25th wedding anniversary part of this strapline was said to me, "Noreen, you have come out of your shell." Surely, my classmate didn't consider me to be a mollusc, rather the expression "come out of your shell" is an idiomatic expression that suggests becoming more interested in other people and more willing to talk and take part in social activities or to be or become less shy or reticent and more sociable, outgoing, or enthusiastic. My classmate who first knew me at the start of secondary school used this iconic idiom to express that I am less timorous. Perhaps if he had any idea of me becoming a presbyter he would have said, "No chance." But God, who empowered me through the Holy Spirit helped me to "come out of my shell".

As you are reading this newsletter, in a matter of weeks we will be moving from the post-resurrection scenes to Pentecost where we gain knowledge of the first disciples coming out of their shell. Pentecost - the day fell 50 days after Passover and was originally a harvest festival. In the New Testament times it also commemorated Moses' giving of the Law on Sinai. Three phenomena occurred that made the coming of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost an unmistakable and unique event, somewhat akin to "come out of the shell" the rushing wind, the visible flames resting on each believer present and speaking in "other tongues." The Greek verbs meaning "to fill" are always mentioned in the passive voice where the filling with the Spirit is described. We "are filled" we do not "fill ourselves." I can only imagine how those first disciples felt on the day of Pentecost when they were filled with Holy Spirit that brought them out of their shell giving them a boldness that cannot be denied. So, whenever we walk along the seashore looking with admirable joy at the
