BUCKS COUNCILLORS NEWS.

A new vision A for parking across

Buckinghamshire. Buckinghamshire Council has unveiled its vision and ambition for parking across the county as part of a new Parking Strategy which sets out how the service will develop in coming years.

From embracing new technology to providing customers with greater choice and flexibility and from streamlining parking charges to promoting greater safety and reducing congestion, the document, which was agreed by Cabinet yesterday (Thursday 22 February), starts to align the

different on and off-street parking arrangements from the previous legacy councils into one strategy which covers the whole county.

Key aims within the strategy include:

• A commitment to maintaining the upkeep of quality parking provision across the county.

• Working to ensure the council's parking operations are fully self-funded as is required legally.

• Exploring ways to give people flexibility in parking options across the county.

• Intelligent use of parking enforcement to ensure effective enforcement locally and county-wide.

• A gradual transition to online/digital payments for all parking, reflecting trends in payment preferences which have accelerated in recent years, whilst maintaining cash payments for as long as economically possible in existing locations.

• Ensuring residents and customers are kept fully informed of changes.

The strategy has been informed by a previous review of current parking arrangements and starts to address

inconsistencies across the county and identify where changes are needed to provide a better service for residents.

One of the first actions the council is taking is signing up to the National Parking Platform (NPP), a Department for Transport pilot scheme which aims to provide greater flexibility in paying for parking while providing value for money. The scheme will be piloted in council car parks in Wycombe and will allow customers to choose which supplier they purchase their parking time through.

Council pledges an extra £5 million

investment in fixing roads. Buckinghamshire Council has pledged an extra £5 million of funding this coming year to boost investment in repairs to roads across the county, adding to the £105 million already committed to the road network over the next four years.

The money will be used to fund much needed repairs across the county caused by long periods of very wet weather this winter, and councillors agreed to 'deploy the funding as quickly as possible'.

In total Buckinghamshire Council has committed £110m to highway repairs and improvements over the next four years. The overall investment will go towards maintaining and improving the road network across the county,

including a range of works and schemes, from the

so-called 'Plane and Patch' programme, where whole sections of roads are resurfaced, to one-off large scale projects like Station Road Cheddington and cleansing our 85,000 gullies.

As we move into warmer weather in the spring months the temporary repairs reduce in number so longer-lasting improvement works and bigger resurfacing projects can be undertaken.

This is the second year in a row that Buckinghamshire Councillors have committed an additional £5 million of funding for the county's roads, recognising the impact of two wet winters and what residents have asked for their money to be spent on.

Money down the drain for a company

prosecuted for fly-tipping in Bucks.

A drainage company has paid a hefty price for making the error of paying a rogue trader to dispose of their

commercial waste after it was found fly-tipped in Buckinghamshire.

Drainiac Ltd, pleaded guilty to the offense of failing in their duty of care when transferring waste to a waste

remover when the case was heard at High Wycombe Magistrates Court on Wednesday 21 February 2024.

The court heard that on Wednesday 21 June 2023, mixed building waste was found dumped at Gravelly Way, Penn, in Buckinghamshire. Buckinghamshire Council's waste enforcement team carries out regular searches of the area, due to it being heavily blighted with fly-tipping.

On this occasion, an enforcement officer found evidence amongst the waste linking it to an address in Eastern Dene, High Wycombe. The details were later traced back to a company called Drainiac Ltd who explained they were approached by a man with a van asking for scrap metal. Drainiac Ltd had no scrap metal but explained they had some waste. The man with the van accepted £50 cash and removed the waste from the property.

Magistrates at High Wycombe Magistrates' Court fined Drainiac Ltd £4,000 and ordered them to pay a

contribution of £1,049.89 towards the council's clean up and investigation costs - making a total to pay of £5,049.89.

Roofing company pays a high price in court.

A roofing and building company who failed to carry out proper checks on a 'man with a van' who offered to dispose of trade waste for them has paid a high price for its error after being prosecuted in court.

Highlife Roofing and Builders Ltd pleaded guilty to the offence of failing in its duty of care when transferring waste to a waste remover when appearing at High Wycombe Magistrates Court on Wednesday 21 February 2024.

The court heard that on Tuesday 18 July 2023, mixed building waste, including black sacks and wooden material, was found dumped at Holtspur Lane, Wooburn Green in Buckinghamshire. An officer from Buckinghamshire Council's waste enforcement team investigated and found evidence amongst the dumped waste, giving an address in The Green, Wooburn Green, High Wycombe.

The details were later traced back to a company called Highlife Roofing and Builders Ltd, who explained they were approached by a man with a van who offered to remove waste from a property.

The man took the waste which was later found dumped just down the road from where it had been collected. Highlife Roofing and Builders Ltd workers admitted they saw the waste dumped the next day but explained they didn't pick it back up as it was 'no longer their problem'.

Magistrates at High Wycombe Magistrates' Court fined Highlife Roofing and Builders Ltd \pounds 6,000 and ordered the company to pay a contribution of \pounds 1,289.71 towards the council's clean up and investigation costs – making a total to pay of \pounds 7289.71.

New library collections will provide invaluable resource for families with

children. A new range of books covering topics around parenting, childhood and childcare are now

available for loan at two libraries in Buckinghamshire.

Parenting and Childcare Topics (PACT) is a unique collection of 170 different books designed to help parents and carers of children and young people to navigate a variety of topics from pregnancy, to dealing with complex emotions and situations, right up to approaching

university. The books cover everything from general

parenting tips to specific situations such as being separated parents or caring for a child with special educational needs and disabilities.

Many of the books are written directly for adults, but a number are also written for the children and young people, including books around bullying and puberty.

A variety of books on the topics of parenting and childcare are already available across all libraries in Buckinghamshire but the enhanced PACT series has been

introduced in two of the biggest libraries as an additional resource, with the support of local business, Limitless Tutoring, who have sponsored the collections.

Creating an age friendly Buckinghamshire

for all. Buckinghamshire Council has outlined its

commitment to helping older people in Buckinghamshire live healthy, active and independent lives as set out in its Healthy Ageing Strategy which has been formally

approved by the council this week.

The document sets out the vision for how Buckinghamshire aspires to be a place for all residents to enjoy

growing older in an age friendly community. The strategy also includes an action plan of how the vision will be achieved.

Angela Macpherson, Cabinet Member for Health and Wellbeing explained: "Healthy aging means living a healthy and fulfilling life, being able to participate in activities and contribute to your community. It also encompasses having financial security and living in a suitable home in a safe and thriving community. With the right policies, environments and support, people can age well and live independent and meaningful lives."

To become an age friendly community, the strategy focuses on eight interconnecting areas outlined by the World Health Organisation (WHO):

- Outdoor spaces and buildings
- Transport
- Housing
- · Participation in society
- Volunteering and employment
- Communication and information
- Community support for health and wellbeing

• Respect and social inclusion

In the first year, the focus for Buckinghamshire will be on two priorities - outdoor spaces and buildings, and participating in society.

To oversee the implementation of the strategy a multiagency Age Friendly Bucks Partnership has been set up with external partners including the NHS and voluntary sector organisations. The views and ideas of residents and community groups have shaped the aims of the strategy and will continue to inform the implementation.

To further support the success of the strategy Buckinghamshire Council has joined the UK Network of Age Friendly Communities which is run by the Centre for

Ageing Better and affiliated to the WHO's Global Network for Age Friendly Cities and Communities. Being a

member of this network provides access a range of

additional resources including good practice guidance and advice. In addition, the council has partnered locally with Age UK Buckinghamshire to ensure a local focus is maintained.

Road repairs Goose Acre – West End Road. By the time you read this newsletter the long-awaited work on the Goose Acre - West End Road repairs should be completed. Last month we were not sure this project would be included in the 2023/24 financial year but as we all now aware we have been fortunate. Although there are other areas in the village that will need attention none were as bad as the section around the junctions of Hillside, Goose Acre and Sunnybank where it appears the road was never properly constructed by the developer when the houses were built at the top end of Goose Acre in the 1960's. We expect that the quality is to be as good as the Station Road.

FARMING AND FOOD

As I write on 13th March, we have had another 15 ml of rain in the last 24 hours and all the floods in the fields and all around are back! According to the Meteorological Office we had the wettest February since records began in 1836, with 445.8mm of rain.

This last six months has resulted in a lack of crops in the ground and the pressures on growers is affecting their mental health. We urgently need some good weather to give us some chance of planting crops for the spring and summer. Those of you who have vegetable plots or allotments will be able to relate to this... you can't even get a fork into the ground right now it's so sodden.

Stock farmers with sheep and lambs which need to go outside are waiting for dry weather too.

I have been wondering how potato farmers are affected by the wet weather and can quote from a recent article. A Lancashire farmer says his business has been hit both in harvesting and storage quality. In January some 20% of the crop – which should have been harvested in October – remained in the ground, while he keeps hope of harvesting some in the spring, frost and rot is likely to lead to an overall yield loss of as much as 50%. Across various parts of the country, growers have reported lower yields and wet crops going into store and then breaking down. For the consumer I guess it means more increased prices and more imported food if available.

Other countries also have their climate problems, however.

I recently made a short trip to Iceland. Now there's a country with agricultural challenges. Although our visit wasn't particularly agricultural but with G Adventures, I did learn a little about the farming. In between climbing Glaciers, going underground in a lava tunnel and bathing in a hot spring!

They have a very short growing season but do grow grain such as wheat and barley. Also, they store lots of hay and straw as I could see wrapped circular bales in stacks at the farmsteads. Big modern barns could be seen in some places and these would be housing their animals for the winter. Sheep, cattle and pigs. We did visit one farm for lunch where we ate their own beef burgers which were delicious. The animals were in the same barn as ourselves on a different level, in deep straw and munching hay. Free to wander about they could lay in one of the feeding bays and visit the robot milker when they wanted. A very modern concept.

The Icelandic horse is a beautiful animal. Originating in Scandinavia they are short and stocky with very thick coats and a special gait. They have two additional gaits to other horses. The Tolt and Flying Pace. We were lucky enough to see this when out driving and it is most unusual and beautiful to watch. These horses are very popular around the world, particularly as a teaching aid. As they are a very good first horse. They are exported all around the world.

One of my first meals in Reykjavik was Skyr yoghurt which they eat with single cream and brown sugar! I avoided the additions and it was absolutely scrumptious. I was told that the Icelandic Skyr is the best!

We were taken for a visit to a tomato grower. Like here, huge greenhouses full of tomato vines but water from the glaciers heated by their natural heat and piped around. I was fascinated by the bee colonies which are brought in from Holland in special cardboard boxes. These are placed high up above the flowering vines, opened, and the bees fly around pollinating.

Hot of the press! in the latest Farmers Weekly, as I finish writing on March 16th...English Farmers plan to be the first to grow GE Crops. Gene-edited cereal cultivars. Two wheats, Cadenza and Fielder, and a barley called 'Golden Promise'. The opportunity to grow gene-edited crops in England follows the enactment of the Genetic Technology (Precision Breeding) Bill in 2023. The legal change applies to England only. This has yet to be adopted by devolved parliaments and the EU.





The New Life of Easter. First of all, happy

Eastertide to everyone. Eastertide comprises fifty days of celebration concerning the Resurrection of Christ, and it is rightly said that this is a celebration of the promise of a *new* form of life – a new way of being as we are drawn to participate even in the life and the nature of God Himself in Christ. Resurrection is not merely some form of resuscitation, in which life just somehow comes back but otherwise continues exactly how it always had done.

People often remark on Easter as being fittingly represented by the re-emergence of life in the springtime, but this doesn't actually capture the more 'radical' sense of *newness* suggested by the Resurrection Life, since the new growth of Spring is simply a resprouting of what we are already accustomed to. The word 'radical' comes from the Latin word *radix*, meaning root. Eastertide, in this sense, aims to get nearer to the *root* of what a truly fulfilling life – one that is actively drawn into the Life of God through and in Christ – actually is. This is the Easter promise of an ultimate renewal of life, known in the New Testament texts as the 'new creation'.

In Christian tradition this new creation is something we are called to explore, and to do so means learning from the lesson of Lent that other things might need to be 'let go of first. A classic Easter Sunday text is therefore the story of a woman called Mary Magdalene encountering the risen Christ outside the empty tomb. Though she doesn't recognize that it is Christ at first, as soon as she does her first reaction is to cling to Him, and she is immediately told by Christ not to do so, because He, the Son of God, must return to the Father, in order to draw her and others into the Life of God. Like Mary, our journey does not simply end at Easter, nor does it end by clinging to our first conception or partial recognition of the risen Christ. Instead, Easter is the new beginning of a new form of exploration concerning a newly promised transformation of life to come.

A blessed Eastertide to you all

A MESSAGE FROM THE MINISTER.

I was pleasantly surprised on hearing the prehistoric idiom "Cleanliness is next to godliness mentioned in a conversation at a church event a few weeks ago. Like this individual, I grew up with the idea that the saying signifies people have a moral duty to keep themselves and their homes clean. It is an archaic proverb found in Baby-Ionian and Hebrew religious tracts.

The inauguration of the idiom in the English language, in a modified form is found in the writings of philosopher and scientist Sir Francis Bacon. He wrote, "Cleanness of body was ever deemed to proceed from a due reverence to God." John Wesley, the co-founder of Methodism, may have been the originator of the slogan. In 1791, he referenced the phrase in one of his sermons as we use it today. Wesley wrote, "Slovenliness is no part of religion. Cleanliness is indeed next to Godliness."

However, the general principle behind the practice dates back long before the time of Wesley to the worship customs mentioned in the book of Leviticus. The Israelites were certainly concerned about the concepts of "clean" and "unclean" because a major portion of the Mosaic Law outlines the principles of each. Among the unclean things that God's people were to avoid are dead bodies and carcasses, eating certain animals, leprosy, and bodily discharges.

But Jesus extended its meaning in a discourse about traditions in Matthew's Gospel where He challenged the religious leaders, "It is not what goes into the mouth of a man that defiles and dishonours him, but what comes out of the mouth, this defiles and dishonours him." Initially after hearing the idiom, I didn't know if that person was only referring to keeping the church clean or something far deeper. Was it just about wiping the floor; the pots and pans; the toilets; dusting the benches; the cupboards? I am not sure! On the contrary, the Biblical understanding of this archaic proverb has an inward resolution that modifies or metamorphoses the outward that not only please us but God. Therefore, shining the cupboards and counter-tops should reflect what is within the heart. Cleanliness is next to godliness refers to our responsibility to have a relationship with God whereby we explicitly recognize Him, listen to what He says, and obey with the goal of the keeping our hearts pure, clean, and assertive to the things of God. We believers must hold to the central reality of our faith, Christ, for He is the source of all our righteousness, holiness, and redemption. I think "Cleanliness is next to godliness" is not an illusion. How eerily prophetic those words can be!




